 Private agreement between two parties to buy or sell an asset at a predetermined price and date in the future.

 Reduce the risk of price changes and to plan for future production.



Pantry or Food Bank creates inventory of needs

Matches with Producer or Producers

Agreement is made on pricing, availability, harvest

Delivery of goods is made







# Farmer/Rancher Grant Program

#### <u>Overview</u>

- Project Team:
  - Farmer or Rancher (PI)
  - Technical Advisor
- Project Length: 1-3 years
- Funding: up to \$35,000

#### **How It Works**

- Funds are issued directly to the Farmer or Rancher
- Producers conduct on-farm research and field trials with support of a technical advisor
- Education and outreach activities ensure that findings are shared with the broader community

### Who can apply for the Farmer/Rancher Program?

- Primary occupation is farming or ranching and have a farm/ranch taxpayer identification number (TIN)
- Part-time producer with at least \$1,000 (or equivalent) of documented annual income from farming or ranching activities



# Professional+ Producer Grant Program

#### **Overview**

- Project Team:
  - Agricultural Professional (PI)
  - Producers (at least 3)
- Project Length: 1-3 years
- Funding: up to \$85,000

#### **How It Works**

- With the collaboration of at least three producers, projects must integrate research and education aiming to advance the three components of sustainable agriculture
- Outcomes result in quantifiable benefits for producers, increase the preservation of the natural and social resources upon which agriculture relies, and be shared with other producers



# Tips for Applying

- Read through the Call for Proposals (CFP) and materials on the website – make sure it's a good match.
- Look into other SARE funded projects see if there are projects that relate to your idea; look at the future recommendations' sections of the final reports.
- Be sure your proposal addresses SARE's goals.
- Be clear why is this project needed, what are you trying to learn, how will you conduct your research, and how will you get your results out and to who?
- How will the project benefit other producers?

#### **Resources for Applying**

In this section, you will find documents and resources helpful in preparing your proposal submission. This includes templates, budgetary information, and hints for strong proposal writing.

It will also be useful to review <u>archived Calls</u> under each grants program section, <u>grantwriting webinars</u>, <u>reporting expectations and materials</u> and the <u>subaward process</u> for current grantees.

#### **Submission Process**

Submitted proposals that fulfill the submission requirements will undergo the evaluation of a Technical Review Panel - researchers, educators, and agricultural producers- following the scoring review criteria included in the Call for Proposal. The Technical Review Panel ranks and provides recommendations of proposals. The Western SARE Administrative Council selects the proposals to be funded during its winter and summer meetings. You will be notified of the status of your submission shortly after the final selection.



The Western SARE Farmer/Rancher Research & Education Grant Program focuses on advancing on-farm sustainability solutions by funding innovative producer-driven research and outreach. This grant program involves agricultural producers (main applicants) and technical advisor(s) implementing projects to address identified needs in sustainable agriculture.

We recognize that producers are always innovating and improving on-farm/ranch practices. This program aims to honor producer innovation by funding on-farm research that benefits and is led by producers themselves. We encourage you to explore whether this grant program is right for you.

#### **How the Program Works**

Producers may apply for up to \$35,000.

With a Farmer/Rancher Grant, a producer and a technical advisor work together to develop a project (1-3 years in scope) that conducts **both research and outreach** on a sustainable





## **Specialty Crops**

### **Small Grants Program**

- \$500 \$10,000
- Fruits, vegetables, nuts, herbs, medicinal plants
- Projects that promote and help teach the general public about the growth and consumption of local specialty crops



- Open to Private Entities (individuals and/or businesses), Community Gardens, Garden Clubs, Community-Based Nonprofit Organizations, Local Schools, Colleges and the University, Conservation Districts, Municipal Governments
- Reimbursement grant
- Must include an educational/ demonstration component
- 25% match required can be waived with a donation to a local food security organization
- Projects must be completed by September 1, 2025







## **Business Builder Applicant Eligibility**

#### WY Farm, ranch, and fish/seafood businesses that are:

Small (up to \$350k annual sales) - and mid-scale (\$350k-\$999,999 annual sales)

Producing in, sourcing from, and focused on local and regional markets

#### WY Value-added food businesses that are:

Small- and mid-scale

Sourcing food ingredients locally or regionally

Focusing on local or regional markets

#### WY Food processors, aggregators, and distributors that:

Source locally or regionally

Serve multiple small- and mid-scale food and farm

businesses

Focus on local or regional markets

- BB Grants do not require a match but do in general require upfront payment of costs by the applicant, who is then reimbursed for their expenses
- Applicants required to have UEI and EIN or SSN number

## Sponsored Tuition amount is \$1995

- 1. We are looking for people that have a value added product with a complete recipe.
- 2. Any participant that is getting the USDA sponsored tuition does not have to pay anything upfront.
- 3. The USDA sponsored tuition does have some requirements: demographic survey, pre program survey, and a post program survey. The participant is required to complete the program. They have to sign a contract that if they do not meet these requirements then they will have to pay the tuition (\$1,995).

## Infrastructure Grant Open March-May



- Wyoming Hunger Initiative Infrastructure Grants are intended to support infrastructure and longevity of anti-hunger organizations as well as long-term, sustainable solutions to food insecurity across the state.
- Grant funding can be used for equipment to expand capacity, longterm projects that promote self-sufficiency and increase food security, solutions that encourage systematic change with regard to local food access, and educational programs.
- Infrastructure Grants open annually in March, are reviewed by the Wyoming Hunger Initiative Grants committee in May, and final decisions are announced in June.
- Wyoming Hunger Initiative knows there is no such thing as a one-sizefits-all solution to hunger and instead supports the inspiring anti-hunger warriors who fight every day to find the best answer for their community.






Farm to School is building relationships between local producers and school districts as well as child care centers

## **Grants for Farm to School Projects**



- Producers can get grants to grow for schools
- Schools can get grants to buy from local producers

\*Depends on what grants are available at the time

## When grants are not available



Schools can purchase directly from producers without a grant.

Purchasing standards just need to be followed.

## **USDA Local Foods For Schools (LFS)**



- This is currently not funded
- Wyoming Department of Education has submitted all the required proposals
- Waiting to hear from USDA if funds are going to be made available

## LFS - If Funded



- Will include both
  - The National School Lunch Program (NSLP)
  - Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- Duration
  - Three years from time of award
- Nationally
  - \$471.5 million for schools (NSLP)
  - \$188.6 million for child care (CACFP)

## What can be purchased with LFS funds (if funded)



Only unprocessed or minimally processed agricultural commodities will be allowed for purchase with LFS funds.

Delivered to the school or child care center

### **Process if funded:**



- Protein Track
- Produce Track
- WDE will put out an RFP for both tracks July 2025
- Could be awarded regionally
- Will run until funds are gone

## **Process if funded - continued**

- WYOMING FARM TO SCHOOL
- Schools / Child Cares will opt into the program
- Center amount allotted to each school / child care
- School / child care will work with awarded vendor directly to purchase
- Bill will be sent to WDE for payment
- Responsibility of vendor and school / child care to sell / buy what is allowed and keep track of limits

\*USDA is not allowing for any administrative costs

#### VALUE-ADDED PRODUCER GRANT (VAPG)

VAPG assists Agricultural Producers in starting or expanding Value-Added activities related to the post-harvest processing and/or marketing of Value-Added Agricultural Products. .

<u>Examples</u>: processing livestock into packaged meat products, wheat into flour, wool into clothing, tomatoes into spaghetti sauce, milk into cheese, etc.

- □ Planning & Working Capital Grants require 100% Matching Funds
- Applicant must have an active SAM.gov registration
- There is NO rural requirement
- VAPG is a NATIONWIDE COMPETITION
